FOOTPATH LIAISON OFFICERS

Our Footpath Liaison Officers, Mr and Mrs Hanger of Woodlands, Bindon Lane, have now sold their property and left the area. FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT

In December 2002 our Parish Council adopted the Model Publication Scheme for Local Councils (Core Classes Only). COUNCIL TAX

You will all have received your Council Tax bills and are no doubt not best pleased about the size of the increase. This is primarily attributable to changes in the way central government distributes funding support to local councils. This has channelled more funding to the north of England at the expense of southern counties. It particularly does not take into account the large number of second homes in Purbeck. Although it has brought no positive results, members of the Parish Council have been active in voicing their disapproval of this unfair treatment by writing to the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister. Closer to home we have had to raise the Parish Precept by £300 this year in order to cover our annual liabilities. This represents an increase of less than £1 per elector and I still one of the lowest in Purbeck.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

At our March meeting we were addressed by Mr Andy Lloyd of Dorset Community Action (DCA) on the subject of affordable housing. This term covers rental properties and part ownership as well as starter homes to buy. DCA act as an impartial agent working for the local communities with housing associations and the local councils to identify local needs and ability to provide affordable housing. It is important to state that this initiative is intended to be for local people including those younger members of the community who may have had to move away to obtain housing. In order to try and cope the requirement within East Stoke we will be distributing a survey form in the near future for completion should you wish to register your individual need for this type of housing.

CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUND

A play and recreational area was established within Middlefield Cottages about 30 years ago and the ground was leased to East Stoke Parish Council by Purbeck District Council (PDC). This facility has fallen into disrepair and all that currently remains is the area for ball games bounded on 3 sides by high level fencing that has been damaged by fallen tree and overgrown vegetation. The grassed area although it is maintained by PDC is also somewhat uneven. Number 11

Middlefield Community Group (MCG) has been established with the aim of re-instating the Play Area with new equipment meeting current safety legislation. The Parish Council supports the group's initiative in this venture and as this is in intended to be a facility available to all children within the Parish, the Council has offered to assist in progressing this matter.

In the short term PDC have agreed to repair the existing fencing and clear the vegetation around the side. The goal now is to raise the funding for the play equipment, insurance and annual maintenance. Clearly this will amount to a fairly considerable sum and the Parish Council together with MCG are pursuing various sources for grants to cover the capital expenditure on the equipment. Additionally, MCG are planning a number of fund raising activities with the aim of getting the fund started to cover the annual liabilities. We would urge all members of the Parish to support this worthwhile project. Any offers of help with fundraising would be gratefully received.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Delegated and non-delegated applications applicable to our area are sent to us from PDC for consideration each month. Those applications to be discussed will be posted on the notice board before our monthly meeting is held. Anyone who has objections or indeed are in favour of the applications as posted are welcome to attend our meeting and pass their opinions on to us in the Public Participation Time at the beginning of each meeting at 7.00 p.m.

MONKEY WORLD

There have been a series of Planning Applications received in respect of this business. We received a request from our neighbouring Parish, Wool, to set up a monitoring committee which we have done. The committee have been very busy and have made a number of reports and recommendations in respect of the applications but Purbeck District Council have seemed reluctant to form any particular view and have continued to pass all applications submitted. We and the monitoring committee continue to press Purbeck District Council for a more robust approach to future applications. RUINS OF OLD ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Dorset County Archaeologists have now visited the site (together with the land-owner) and put in their bid to English Heritage. The idea is now that a team from the DCC Historic Environment Department will come in early August (after birds have finished nesting) to clear the churchyard of dead trees, brambles, etc. and put up temporary barbed wire fencing on the existing posts to keep it stock proof. At that point Bournemouth University Archaeologists will send in their team to do a detailed survey and advise on the best conservation methods. Once this is done, proper fencing (good pot-and-rails plus sheep wire) will be put in place and local sheep and goats will be put in every so often to graze it. Meantime students have been continuing to conduct resistivity readings round the church area to see if other buildings were ever nearby.
